Labor Day, the first Monday in September, is a creation of the labor movement and is dedicated to the social and economic achievements of American workers. It constitutes a yearly national tribute to the contributions workers have made to the strength, prosperity, and well-being of our country. Don't forget that we will be closed Monday September 2nd.

We will never forget!



23 years ago on September 11, 2001, 2,977 people were killed in the deadliest terrorist attacks in American history. The moment shocked the nation. Two planes, hijacked by Islamic jihadists vowing death to all Americans, plowed into both towers at the World Trade Center in New York. Another plane was flown into the Pentagon in Washington, DC. A fourth plane, presumably headed for the White House or the U.S. Capitol, was heroically diverted by passengers and ended up crashing in an empty field in Pennsylvania. After reports of the first plane hitting the North Tower, millions watched the second plane hit the South Tower on live television.

It was a terrifying, startling, and humbling event for the country. The 9/11 attacks were the deadliest on American soil since the shock attack at Pearl Harbor 60 years before, and the sense of outrage was reminiscent of that moment. The attacks in New York occurred in the country's busiest city on a busy workday. And the staggered nature of the attacks meant that news footage captured almost everything as it happened, ensuring that millions of Americans saw the events precisely as they unfolded. Each day we remember the victims, the families, and survivors dealing with loss, recognizing the lasting consequences of 9/11 on individual lives.

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DISCOVER ENERGY-SAVING TIPS FOR A COOLER SUMMER

As temperatures rise, so does our need for air conditioning. Let's dive into ways to help keep your home cool and your energy bills lower, along with other energy-saving tips.



1. Avoid using the oven during the hottest parts of the day. Grill or microwave meals or prepare cold dishes.

2. Unplug electronic devices when you're not using them. They can still generate heat in standby mode.

3. If you have outdoor spaces like a patio, use umbrellas or shade sails to provide protection from the sun. It can help keep your outdoor area cooler and reduce the need for additional cooling indoors.

4. Use a programmable thermostat to automatically adjust the temperature based on your schedule. Set the A/C at a higher temperature when you're away or asleep. Check out thermostat rebates at *GoldenStateRebates.com*.

5. Run your ceiling fan counter-clockwise when it's hot. It creates a downdraft which makes you feel cooler.

6. Shift some chores like laundry and running the dishwasher outside of the on peak hours of 4 p.m. to 9 p.m. Save even more if you do laundry on the weekends before 2 p.m.
